# On Stage: Creating a Community Dialogue Around Live Theater

**Mission:** To make local theater relevant to younger and non-traditional audiences and to lay the groundwork for building future theater audiences

Overview: On Stage raises awareness of the theater offerings in the Twin Cities to academic classes and groups. On Stage brings actors to college classrooms and community settings around the Twin Cities. Local actors and students read scenes from a play in current local production followed by a lively discussion of the themes tying in current events, personal values, and narratives, and stimulating critical thinking. Subsequently attending the full play is encouraged. The purpose of the program is to enhance in-class learning, make local theater relevant to younger and non-traditional audiences, and to lay the groundwork for building future theater attendances. Discussions cover relevant social, political, and cultural topics that come up in Twin Cities plays including gender and racial violence and inequity, LGBTQ+ discrimination, cultural diaspora and alienation and aging.

Since On Stage was launched in the fall of 2016, On Stage has partnered with fifteen theater companies in the Twin Cities, covering thirty-four plays. Of the plays that On Stage has promoted/discussed in classrooms, over **8,500** students and community members have been exposed to new theater and new theater venues, and over **28%** of these students and community members paid to see the show that we were promoting/discussing. On Stage continues to focus on partnering with more small/mid-sized theaters that don't have the resources for their own outreach efforts.

On Stage has partnered with the following Theaters: Mixed Blood Theatre, Park Square Theatre, Jungle Theater, Six Points Theater, Pillsbury House Theatre, Frank Theatre, Children's Theatre Company, Yellow Tree Theatre, New Dawn Theatre, Theater Mu, Exposed Brick Theatre, Ten Thousand Things, Open Eye Theatre, History Theatre and Theater Latté Da.

On Stage has facilitated discussions with the following Colleges and Universities: St. Thomas University, University of Minnesota, St. Catherine University, Metro State University, Augsburg College, Macalester College, Concordia University, Hamline University, Bethel University, Minneapolis Community & Technical College, Minneapolis College of Art and Design, Normandale Community College, North Hennepin Community College, Hennepin Technical College, Century College, Inver Hills Community College, Hazelden Graduate School of Addiction Studies.

On Stage has facilitated discussions with the following Departments: Communications, Sociology, Theater, English - Creative Writing, English - Literature, History, Education, Psychology, Music, Family Social Sciences, Leadership, Linguistics, Law, Environmental Science, Political Science, Women and Gender Studies, African American Studies, Addiction Studies, Culinary Arts.

When Covid hit in March 2020, On Stage launched a new education experience for students. This online program, OnStage/OnLine, is a series of discussions based on plays that are 'in the works' to be produced and performed in the Twin Cities in the future, designed to: stimulate an interest in live theater, examine the cultural context of a play, and, of course, to have fun! We have since returned to in-person classes but have been facilitating both in-person and online discussions and we will continue to have both teaching options moving forward.

# **ON STAGE:** The Color Purple—Schedule

- 1. Normandale Community College COMM 1131: Intercultural Communication Willie Johnson Wednesday April 17, 12:00 1:00PM. (22 STUDENTS)
- \* The primary purposes of this course are to raise awareness of cultural values, beliefs, norms, and biases and address how culture affects communication choices on the interpersonal, group, cross-cultural and global levels. Issues of nationality, race, ethnicity, class, gender, religion, etc., will be addressed.
- 2. North Hennepin Community College ENGL 1900: Intro to Creative Writing Farrah, Kaelie Wednesday April 17, 2:00 3:00PM. (10 STUDENTS)
- \* This class is designed for students who want to try creative writing, perhaps for the first time, and learn more about the creative process.
- 3. Macalester College HIST 294: Feminism and Change Amy Sullivan Friday April 19, 1:10 2:10PM. (16 STUDENTS)
- \* A history of feminism and feminist thought in the United States between 1848-2022, this course focuses on women's rights: the ideologies, leaders, and actions that forced change in long-held gender roles and patriarchal governing norms.
- 4. Summit Academy STEM North/GED Program Abbi Mayland, Drew Cannedy Monday April 22, 10:00 11:00AM. (10 STUDENTS)
- \* The GED 10-week program covers the four parts of the GED exam: Reasoning Through Language Arts, Mathematical Reasoning, Science, and Social Studies.
- 5. Minneapolis College WGSS 1140: Gender, Media and Pop Culture (CLASS #2) Davis, Jill Monday April 22, 1:30 2:30PM. (22 STUDENTS)
- \* This course explores the powerful effects of popular literary, artistic, mass and digital media cultures on our lives. You will study how social norms of gender are represented through different media and pop cultural mediums and the varying degrees to which individuals and communities have the power to shape, reform, and even transform those representations.
- 6. Century College SOC 102: Intro to Sociology (CLASS 2) Corey Culver Tuesday April 23, 9:15 10:15AM. (12 STUDENTS)
- \* This course is a survey of sociology's major theoretical perspectives and research methods. Basic concepts include culture, socialization, groups, organizations, deviance, social institutions, change, and inequalities based on class, race, and gender.
- 7. Saint. Paul College Culinary Arts Class (NOTE: FOOD EVENT! Concept Mrs. Celie's Breakfast. For Lunch! (In the book, Celie serves Shug pancakes with butter, ham steak, fried eggs, grits, biscuits with honey, and coffee to cheer her up) Jason Ross Tuesday April 23, 11:15 12:30PM. (18 STUDENTS)
- \* Students are introduced to aspects of quantity range, bake shop, short-order and pantry operations. Note: Students will be making food inspired by the play. Open to the public.
- 8. Minneapolis College CMST 1015: Mass Communication Kathleen Crawford Tuesday April 23, 1:30 2:30PM. (8 STUDENTS)
- \* This course is an examination of the impact and effects of mass communication in contemporary life. You will learn the historical evolution of communication technologies, as well as related strategic communication industries, such as the media, publishing, social networking, advertising, and public relations.

- 9. Augsburg University THR 255: Intro to Musical Theater Kiyoko Sims Wednesday April 24, 9:20 10:30AM. (20 STUDENTS)
- \* The course examines American musical theater in societal, cultural, and historical context with special attention to the representation of race, class, gender, and sexuality onstage.
- 10. Unity Church-Unitarian: Well-Spring Wednesday, Circle of Peace, Community Stabilization Project (COMMUNITY EVENT) Laura Park, Metric Giles Wednesday April 24 (Well-Spring Wednesday), 7:30 8:30PM. (22 PARTICIPANTS)
- \* This is a special event! It will include community members from several organizations: Unity Church-Unitarian, part of their Well-Spring Wednesday; Community Stabilization Project (CSP); Circle of Peace; Urban Farm and Garden Alliance.
- 11. Minneapolis College WGSS 2213: Engaging Justice: Women's and LGBTQ Social Movements (CLASS #3) Davis, Jill Thursday April 25, 10:30 11:30AM. (8 STUDENTS)
- \* This course examines the role women's and LGBTQ social movements play in the development of social justice thought and action. You will use the speeches, public dispatches, scholarly and artistic works of important figures and organizations in feminist and LGBTQ social movements to investigate the deep and varied meanings of justice in feminist and LGBTQ activism.
- 12. Inver Hills Community College SOC 1100: Intro to Sociology; ENGL 2241: Literature and Social Justice (NOTE: COMBINED ZOOM CLASS) Whitmore, Wayne (NOTE: He is on medical leave so Katherine Nelson is taking over and is offering extra credit to attend); Lisa DuRose Thursday April 25, 3:00 4:00PM. (3 STUDENTS)
- \* Emphasizes methods, basic concepts, terminology, and perspectives used by sociologists in analysis of social relationships. Sociological analysis will focus on American government, family, education, religion, and the economy.
- 13. Hennepin Technical College (Eden Prairie Campus) Gateway to College program (High School Students) Charlotte Guild Friday April 26, 9:00 10:00AM. (20 STUDENTS)
- \* This class explores the systematic study of the relationship between the individual and their society. In the weeks prior to your visit, students will be learning about the discipline of sociology, sociological research, class inequality, and race/ethnicity.
- 14. University of St. Thomas THTR 111: Intro to Theater Shanan Custer Friday April 26, 10:55 12:00PM. (22 STUDENTS)
- \* Foundation in theater and drama for the non-major beginning student; orientation to the dramatic tradition through consideration of plays and playwrights from the Greeks to the present; history of theatrical customs, traditions and conventions as they affect modern stage design, acting, directing, costumes, make-up and criticism.

#### ON STAGE: The Color Purple - Agenda/Topics

IF ONLINE, Lucas will start with POLL#1. LUCAS will welcome everyone and say why we are there/what On Stage is. IF ONLINE, Lucas will then lay down some ground rules (if you have a question, let us know by raising your hand, writing in the chat, or respectfully unmute yourself and ask; please keep your video feed on during this discussion if you are able to; there are closed captions up, so feel free to turn them off; BE OPEN TO TRYING NEW THINGS! We want to engage you and we want to hear from you); Today we are going to get you moving around and discussing some of the issues raised in the play, and we will give you a short summary of the play, who wrote it, and what THEATER LATTE DA is. ASK NEW STUDENTS: Have you been to a play in the last five years? What did you see? Where did you see it?

**EDUCATORS** + **LUCAS** will lead a warm up game!

**OPTION 1:** WALK AROUND THE ROOM. FREEZE! GET IN GROUPS OF 3 OR 4. YOUR MISSION: HOW MANY SONGS DO YOU ALL KNOW AND YOU ALL CAN SING SOME OF IT? THE GROUP WITH THE MOST WINS!

(NOTE: Each team needs a pen and notecard)

EDUCATORS + LUCAS will ask students to GET IN A GROUP OF 3 OR 4 and DISCUSS: (IF ONLINE, 'ROCK THE CHAT' THEN HAVE A FEW STUDENTS UNMUTE TO SPEAK TO THEIR ANSWERS):

- 1. THINK OF A SONG THAT REMINDS YOU OF YOUR CHILDHOOD/WHERE YOU GREW UP. WHY DOES THIS SONG REMIND YOU OF WHERE YOU GREW UP? Who sings/plays an instrument/reads sheet music? Two styles to sing a song? "right" and "wrong"? "church" and "secular"? "clean" and "dirty" / juke joint? 'Rock Me' or 'Didn't it Rain' from Marie and Rosetta two ways to sing it. What is "dirty" music today? Beyonce's new album COWBOY CARTER. Why the reclamation of country music? Why is this such a big deal? JOLENE SONG 2 ways.
- 2. WHEN YOU FEEL DOWN, WHAT DO YOU DO TO FEEL BETTER? WHAT ARE THE SOURCES THAT GIVE YOU STRENGTH? In this play Celie talks to God throughout the play (she needs some assistance/support from something).

EDUCATORS + LUCAS will tell students to <u>VOTE WITH YOUR BODY</u> (IF ONLINE, PUT YOUR FACE CLOSE TO THE CAMERA IF YOU AGREE or use a THUMBS UP emoji, and PUT YOUR FACE AWAY FROM THE CAMERA IF YOU DISAGREE or use a THUMBS DOWN emoji):

- **1. HAVE YOU WRITTEN A LETTER TO SOMEBODY IN THE LAST 3 YEARS?** If yes, who did you write to? Why did you write to them? If not, why not? If you could write a letter to somebody right now, who would it be and why?
- 2. HAVE YOU BEEN IN A SITUATION RECENTLY WHERE YOU FELT POWERFUL? How did that feel? What was the circumstance? Who has power? Who doesn't? What does power look like? Feel like? How do you get it? Does power have a gender? WHO IS A STRONG FEMALE IN YOUR LIFE? Why are they powerful?

EDUCATORS + LUCAS will now lead MATCHING SENTENCES/LINES (NOTE: These are located on the page after the agenda). READ THE NOTE FROM THE WRITER, ALICE WALKER, ABOUT CHARACTERS AND THE LANGUAGE IN THE PLAY ON PG. V. Pass out lines from the play - ask students to read the line and find the other people who have the same line as you. Now have a quick discussion with your group about what this line means (WHO, WHAT, WHERE). Why might she have written it this way? SHOULD ANY OF THE LANGUAGE BE "CORRECTED"? Is there a right and wrong way to communicate and who decides? Hear from each group.

**EDUCATORS** will give a quick summary of the play, (*IF ONLINE, Lucas will SHARE HIS SCREEN to see pics of the play*), who the playwright is, and info about **THEATER LATTE DA**. ADAPTATION: book  $\rightarrow$  movie  $\rightarrow$  play  $\rightarrow$  new movie. MUSIC IMPACTS/HEIGHTENS THE STORYTELLING.

USE THIS AS REFERENCE - DO NOT READ THIS OUT LOUD: THE COLOR PURPLE (The Musical): (March 20 - May 5 @ Theater Latte Da). By Alice Walker. Directed by Daniel J. Bryant. Based on the Pulitzer Prize-winning novel by Alice Walker and adapted for the stage by Pulitzer Prize and Tony Award winner Marsha Norman, this stirring family chronicle follows the inspirational Celie as she journeys from childhood through joy and despair, anguish, and hope, to discover her own unique voice and place in the world. Set in the rural South between 1909 - 1947, the female characters in The Color Purple live in a male dominated society, where a woman's role resembles that of a slave or a sex object. Most of the black male characters dominate women and do so in a violent and oppressive manner. They are not only physically violent but sexually and emotionally abusive,

making the women with whom they live feel fearful, worthless, and inferior with no sense of freedom. But as things progress, the women in The Color Purple start to challenge these traditional male-female roles as a strength of unity.

SAY: For this class, we want the words on the page read out loud, so we are not looking at age, race or gender when assigning who reads what part. If we were casting the play, that would be different.

• When students come "onstage" they should introduce themselves (name, pronouns, field of study)

ASK THREE BRAVE READERS to read SCENE #1 (Pg. 27 - 29). <u>SET UP THE SCENE</u>. *IF ONLINE, Lucas will SHARE HIS SCREEN to see the scene we are reading.* 

Questions: What's that about? What did you hear?

LUCAS WILL PLAY THE INSTRUMENTAL TO "HELL NO" - Describe what you heard/what kind of song is this?

LUCAS WILL PLAY THE INSTRUMENTAL TO "I'M HERE" - Describe what you heard/what kind of song is this?

ASK THREE BRAVE READERS to read SCENE #2 (Pg. 30 - 32). SET UP THE SCENE. IF ONLINE, Lucas will SHARE HIS SCREEN to see the scene we are reading.

LUCAS WILL PLAY THE SONG "HELL NO" - Describe what you heard/how did the music change the scene?

Questions: What's that about? What did you hear?

Wrap up! Questions? DISCLOSURE: Sensitive subject matter (violence against women - the play is hard to watch at times) - just so you all know. IF ONLINE, Lucas will end with POLL#2. Lucas will SHARE HIS SCREEN to show everyone how to get \$15 tix to see the play ALSO, ask educators to plug work they are doing.

On Stage, an outreach program that aims to educate students on the importance of theater, recently visited Century College to hold a discussion on "The Color Purple," an ongoing play at Theater Latté Da. On Stage has been to Century College in the past, bringing awareness to different productions each time.

The traveling troupe of On Stage educators, Harry Waters Jr., Warren Bowles, and Wendy Knox, along with Lucas Frickson, the founder and program manager for On Stage, were hosted by Professor Corey Culver's Introduction to Sociology class. The discussion was insightful, prompting the participants to think more deeply about the issues that are presented in "The Color Purple," a play that exposes deeply rooted societal issues through telling the story of a Black woman living in the South in the 20th century.
